

FROM YOUR RABBI: STATE OF THE CONGREGATION

This month, we wanted to share the "State of the Congregation." I have been here for roughly six months - and what a six months it has been! The leadership team brought me in to serve as Interim Rabbi for two years. They tasked me with renewing and redirecting our Temple Ohev Sholom's vision and operations. The first major part of my task was to get to know people and discern our history.

As we investigate our longer-term history, it becomes clear that our default practices no longer serve our evolving needs. Looking to secure our vitality for the coming years, we are looking at every facet of synagogue life, from the condition and use of our physical plant to our engagement with the broader Jewish and non-Jewish community. We are developing new educational curricula, social action investiture, governance practices, and financial awareness. In this article, I wanted to share a brief overview of some of our initiatives. Please know that this list is a moving target and in no-way conclusive. As we continue to grow our depth, we encounter challenges and opportunities that cause us to take a few steps back to regroup.

For worship, we are blessed to have great musical talent and love for our community. We are involving more people and experimenting with some new ideas. Thus far, the feedback seems good. Of course, the major drawback is that we had to say "Kaddish" for our sanctuary sound system, as it died a month or so back. Thanks to Jon Snavely, we are limping with an old soundboard as we await the installation of a new system. By the way, anyone wanting to contribute – all gifts are welcome. We also have a weekly Saturday morning eclectic Torah study. I call it the "Not your normal Torah study, Torah study."

Sally Jo Bronner (lovingly known as "SJ") and I are creating a new religious school program rooted more in teaching Jewish values, which will help make more sense of the Hebrew and other pieces of the curriculum.

Per the repeated concerns of our need for more social action, we are still holding the collection drives, but also hosted our first Justice Shabbat celebrating the Jewish commitment to justice and our partnerships with other communities. We are investigating using the classrooms in the old building as training centers to help people create businesses and non-profits. On January 22nd, we hosted the first conversation with the Hadee Mosque (thanks to our diligent ladies!).

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On February 23, we kick-off an initiative to work on restoring inner-city Harrisburg, partnering with Capital Rebirth – "Laugh Out Hate" is a social justice comedy night.

Our leadership team gathered for a full-day retreat and training in December. The way in which people are growing teamwork and perspective is gratifying. We are addressing our future needs in the front office from the perspectives of personnel, technology, and systems.

Most of all, we are growing our community. We have more students in religious school this year than last. Every Tuesday, several of us gather for coffee at Elementary Coffee downtown – just to be together. We sponsored eight "Meet & Greets" so that we could all meet. The conversations at each were wonderfully honest and hopeful. We are currently forming focus groups (more on this forthcoming), hoping to bring people together to brainstorm our future focus on specific aspects of congregational life: 1. Education; 2. Socialization; 3. Project/ Programming; and 4. Resource growth and management. Most importantly, these gatherings will help us to better share valuable time with each other.

If you have any thoughts or questions, call me for coffee or a meeting around my table. I look forward to sharing with and learning from each of you.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

My term as President of the Temple Ohev Sholom Board of Trustees started on July 1, 2022. As I write this message for publication in the February Bulletin, I will have been in this position for a little over 6 months. One of the key lessons learned from the past few months is that there are two related pillars by which the entire Board of Trustees needs to operate: communication and transparency. The 2022-2023 Trustees have been operating with these pillars in mind over the past few months, recognizing that there have been quite a few hurdles to overcome. I am generally a "glass half full" person, so I am going to go over the more challenging aspects of temple leadership that the board has faced, and then "get to the good stuff." Because there is plenty of good.



The obvious challenges have been the loss of members and the financial challenges associated with those losses. As generous as the current membership was with the Kol Nidre appeal, we did not meet the levels for which we budgeted. There simply is not enough money to do all the things we want to do now, and we have to really think hard about how we move into the future. Jews seek many different things from temple life. For some it is services, for some it is social action, for some it is friendship and camaraderie and companionship. We say we are all inclusive, but how do we demonstrate that to those not included? We say we are community minded, but how do we show that unless we get involved in the greater community? Who are we? These are the questions with which the board wrestles.

But these challenges have not deterred the Trustees from envisioning a new era for the congregation, one filled with inspired staff, committed trustees and congregants, and terrific programming, which we do have. Read through all of the reports submitted by my fellow trustees and you should agree that we are headed in the right direction. Let me start with the inspired staff. Our interim rabbi, Marc Kline, has made quite a mark on the community and has engaged us in a new strategic planning and visioning effort. He is active in the community and sought out as a speaker in the Central Pennsylvania area. He has listened to our members both current and former, and he has heard them. He is committed to ensuring that Temple Ohev Sholom is known for its Tikkun Olam and Tzedakah (Justice). Jon Snavely has done a fabulous job in keeping the building functioning for all that is happening: meetings, programs, religious school and services. Conrad Smith has really stepped up to make music an integral focus of temple life. His musical direction has greatly enhanced services, and at his suggestion, we now have a cadre of members who share their voices with us on a regular basis. Sally Jo Bronner has brought energy and excitement to the religious school, which is thriving.

We have committed congregants and energized trustees. For one, take a look at the enhanced newsletter that is in your hands, the fabulous programming offered for youth, the social action events that we are sponsoring (check out the flyer for "Laugh out Hate," a night of comedy at the Federal Tap House on February 23, 2023). Our job as trustees is to help you connect to Judaism, to the community, and be proud that you are a member of the Temple Ohev Sholom family. We need you. This is your synagogue; this is your community. We are your home for reform Judaism.

BOARD LETTER TO CONGREGATION

Dear Congregant,

One of the action items that stemmed from the congregational meetings that were conducted last year was a review and update of the Temple's Constitution and Bylaws.

Our task began with looking specifically at the clause that describes about how we offer contracts to our clergy. Very quickly, it became apparent that for our Constitution and Bylaws to be an operating guide for our Temple changing one section would not have the impact of improving how we function as a congregation. Originally, we had committed to completing the revision within six months, but that is not going to be enough time. We need to complete our strategic planning process as a congregation first to ensure we have a living governing document that reflects that plan.

Working with Rabbi Marc, we are embarking on setting a vision for what our congregation will look like in the next few years and for years to come. We will be asking you for input — through focus groups, surveys and meaningful conversations. And we will be working to improve how our board functions to serve the congregation.

This is a process that will take time and include all of us to ensure we have a Temple Ohev Sholom that reflects our congregation.

Revising our Constitution and Bylaws is our priority, but it's important to get it right. With your help, and your patience, we will complete this task and produce a valuable and meaningful tool for our congregation.

I write this report to you at the 6th month mark of my tenure as Religious School Director. I am happy to say that the Religious School is both thriving and in need of some change. First, the good stuff. We currently have 46 students, 8 of whom are new students. We have combined our K/1 class which is taught by Cara Grossfeld. Iris Klinepeter returned to Religious School and is expertly guiding our 2nd graders on their Jewish education path. Deb Davidheiser is a professional educator with two children in Religious School, and she teaches 3rd grade. Similarly, Julie Goddard, professional educator, mother of two in Religious School, teaches the 4/5th grade class. Ann Rosenberg, long time Ohev teacher and Kesher Israel member, does an excellent job teaching 6th grade. One newcomer to Ohev's Religious School is Jennie Baar, teaching 7th grade, and mother to two Religious School students. Both Cara and Jennie have upcoming Be Mitzvah's in their families and we are very excited for them! Sawyer Mitchell was Bar Mitzvahed early in the year, and we have 8 more approaching soon: Jordyn White, 2/18/23, Noah Cohen 2/25/23, Cricket Baar 3/4/23, Chloe Hjelm 3/18/23, Jonah Turk-Geller 6/3/23, Eli Brown 6/23/23, Sydney Kawasaki 9/9/23 and Addy Rosenberg on 9/20/23. As their director, and Be Mitzvah tutor, I have a first-row seat to their growth as young Jewish adults, an experience that I cherish.

Like last year, our students receive a half hour weekly ZOOM lesson in Hebrew. The ability to read Hebrew provides our students with the skills they need to participate in Jewish prayer anywhere in the world. Additionally, Religious School is blessed with Jamie Friedman, mother of two Religious School students, who is baking her way through the year with us. Sarah Kawasaki, mother of two Religious School students, devotes her time and voice to Religious School as well. Sisterhood provides treats to our students for holidays. Mia Rosenberg, parent of two in Religious School, and Doreen Evrard, long time teacher and tutor, have volunteered to help with Pot Luck dinners. Erika Saunders, Rob Teplitz and Ari Nepon have provided steady guidance to me - Erika is the chair of the committee, Rob and Ari are members of the committee - and we are thrilled to welcome parents Jonathan Hjelm and Mia Rosenberg who have recently joined them. Without this team of dedicated folks, Religious School would not be the wonderful place that it is currently. Along with Rabbi Marc, we look forward to growing and thriving.

I have recently refreshed the "How to Be Mitzvah at Ohev" booklet. I also am sharing a template for the Shabbat handout with families so that they can personalize it for their family. Rabbi Marc also meets with the Be Mitzvah students,

helping them understand their readings and craft a "dvar torah" which they will share with the congregation. Rabbi Marc has introduced a youth-oriented siddur to the congregation, which will be used for Be Mitzvahs and Family Shabbats. Denyse Miskin and Ari Nepon are currently handling the ceremony's administrative pieces, and I also thank them.

Thus far, Religious School students have participated in many programs including a consecration potluck and Pizza in the Hut during Sukkot. The 7th grade family service coincided with Simchat Torah, and we all enjoyed unrolling the Torah around the sanctuary, followed by a potluck dinner. The 4th, 5th and 6th grades hosted a family shabbat together and were happily joined by accompaniment from the newly formed Ohev choir. The 7th and 8th grade students from Gesher, Ohev Sholom and The Silver Academy are once again participating in Shamor V'Zakhor, a community wide program during which our students learn about Shabbat and the Holocaust. This major community project includes participation in a joint Shabbaton and a visit to the United States Holocaust Museum in Washington DC on Sunday March 19, 2023. Additionally, all students will also participate in the Schwab Essay Contest due March 2023 and The Reading of the Names ceremony on April 17th at Ohev Sholom.

During the pandemic, Jason Graf helped the congregation pivot to online learning by introducing Shalom Learning. Now that this program has been in use for a year and a half, we are ready to assess the benefits and weaknesses of online learning and discuss how best to move the Religious School forward. I invite all members of the congregation, particularly those with young children, to join these upcoming discussions.

We have welcomed the return of communal festivities with Friday night potluck dinners. Participation and enthusiasm were high at both events. However, to sustain this momentum, we will need to identify and engage more parents who will spearhead future events that will build and strengthen our community. TEMPLE OHEV SHOLOM TRANSITION TEAM

The role of the Transition Team is reflected in Pirkei Avot 2:21, Sayings of the Fathers: "Lo alecha ham'lacha ligmor." Our job is not to complete all the tasks, but neither are we free to desist from it either. When our congregation experienced a change in rabbinic leadership, the Temple leadership took the next step to address the human processing of this change and the reorienting from one reality to another.

A transition team comprised of Shelley Adler, Irith Harpster, April Hutcheson, Reyna Jose, Jeanette Krebs, Steve Miskin and Bekah Saidman-Krauss was appointed to guide this initial process. In consultation with Rabbi Marc Kline, the team organized a variety of "Meet and Mingle" gatherings. These gatherings were a vehicle to create community in conversation.

Some of the themes that emerged from the conversations included:

Reinvigorating the religious school and enhancing the preparation for Be Mitzvot (Gender neutral B'Nai Mitzvot service). In times past, the Be Mitzvah students led more of the service and some congregants have expressed a desire to return to that level of literacy. Corollary to this was a desire for families to have more options to personalize the Be Mitvah service rather than having a standard service.

A desire for the Temple to be more involved in social justice endeavors.

Meaningful communication between the synagogue leadership and the congregation is an imperative.

Restore trust between Temple leadership and members of the congregation where trust had been lost.

A desire for clergy to be more involved with the children in the congregation.

Our mission needs to be articulated to the congregation.

A positive consensus emerged at the gatherings that took place after the High Holidays about opening our doors for a ticketless Yom Kippur.

A desire for more adult learning opportunities.

As of this writing, the Temple is 212 members strong. Financially, the board is currently operating within the current 2022-2023 approved budget. The Temple continues to receive contributions/donations from a variety of sources in both large and small amounts. With regards to Ohev's investments, the board voted to strengthen its existing relationship with the Jewish Community Foundation of Central Pennsylvania and to leverage their investing guidance and management expertise for the Temple's funds.

State of Information Technology by Ari Nepon, Vice President and IT Committee Chair

Temple Ohev Sholom 2.0 is well underway! In the last 6 months, much of the underlying IT infrastructure for Ohev has gone through a revitalization.

To start, our website, https://ohevsholom.org has already been enhanced to showcase the many events and activities at Ohev with photos galore! Our website's Upcoming Events and Calendar sections are now chocked full of the goings on at the Temple. But that only achieved Website 1.5.

Website 2.0 is just around the corner and will bring a member portal, simplified payments and donations that can also be automated, subscription to emails for your areas of interest, simplified "sign in with Google", and much more. Here is a sneak peek screenshot of our Website 2.0 in development.

Behind the scenes, our Temple depends on customized software built for Temples. For years, that software has been Chaverware. In 2022, Chaverware reached its software "end-of-life", and the provider would no longer support it starting in 2023. Over the last quarter, our Temple Team has migrated entirely off of Chaverware to our new platform, Shul Cloud. This new software is tightly integrated with our Temple 2.0 website and will support a much more robust and personalized experience for our membership.



Most recently, the IT Committee assessed our IT costs and identified multiple opportunities to reduce cost, while increasing functionality. By registering with Microsoft's non-profit program, our costs for Microsoft's operating systems and Office software were eliminated. In January, Temple Ohev eliminated additional IT costs by moving to a Google Workspace backed operations platform. By availing ourselves of Google's free non-profit program, Ohev Sholom staff, committees and leadership now have access to a managed and integrated Google Workspace which includes @ohevsholom.org email accounts, personal & shared cloud drives, personal and shared calendars, Google Meet accounts (to replace costly Zoom), Google Docs, Sheets, Chat, and so much more. Additionally, through Google's non-profit program, Ohev Sholom is now able to run substantial free Google Ads campaigns. These ads are already live and are increasing our online traffic and presence.

Many of these services are still very new and being integrated into our everyday IT workings at Ohev Sholom. The IT Committee would love to hear from folks who are interested in these initiatives or about additional IT topics. Contact the committee at itcommittee@ohevsholom.org.

At the end of March/April we will have roofing work begin to replace shingles and other minor fixes. One priority that has crept up is the replacement of our sound system in the sanctuary and chapel. We have been barely getting by for the last few months on the existing 25-year-old system. For safety reasons, all the emergency exit lighting in the building and at Mt. Moriah will be replaced. We have purchased new updated units and Jon Snavely will replace them. When the warmer weather becomes more consistent, we will look to spruce up our curb appeal once again on the outside which will include power washing, landscaping, etc. Of course, there is always something to do from a maintenance standpoint at the Temple.



Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) to be commemorated with the "Reading of Names" program to be held at Temple Ohev Sholom

On Monday evening, April 17, 2023 at 7:30 pm, Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) will be commemorated with the "Reading of Names" program to be held at Temple Ohev Sholom. We hope that you and your family will be able to attend this special opening service and stay for a portion of the Reading of Names program.


In an effort to pass the torch of remembrance to the next generation, students from congregational Religious Schools and the Silver Academy will participate in the opening ceremony. They will also read names with their parents immediately following the opening ceremony.

The Reading of Names is a vigil in which the names of those who perished during the Holocaust are read continuously over a period of 24 hours. "Unto Every Person There is a Name" seeks to dignify the memories of victims of the Shoah (the Nazi Holocaust) by reading their names aloud. These victims were stripped of their names by their oppressors and tattooed with numbers. Through the public reading of the names of Holocaust victims, this program strives to restore a portion of their humanity and to retrieve them from the lost depths of anonymity.


Temple Ohev Sholom's time slots for reading are Tuesday, April 18 from 3:00 am-4:30 am and from 1:30-3:30 pm. RECIPE CORNER

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Sweet Noodle Kugel by Debby Rudy: Ingredients:
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1 stick butter (divided)

1 lb. large curd cottage cheese

6 eggs

1 cup sugar

8 oz. sour cream

1-2 tsp. vanilla

3 cups very fine egg noodles (measured dry)

Topping – mix in a zip lock bag crushed corn flakes cereal + cinnamon + butter (melted)
