FROM YOUR RABBI

We will be celebrating two important holidays over the next two months. As we approach Purim, we must remember how important it is to stand up, even at one's own peril. Despite having lied her way into becoming Queen, she figures out the truth that Albert Einstein taught us, "If I were to remain silent, I'd be guilty of complicity." She stands up to the King and against Haman. Her heroism uncovers Haman's plot to kill all the Jews. She never accosts the King for endorsing the decree in the first place. They all live happily ever after. We spend the holiday sharing sweet gifts and fun parties in their memory.

Next month, we will celebrate Passover, the holiday of liberation. Unlike the Purim story, the ruling authority pays a horrific price for his oppressive regime's abuses. After oppressing the Israelite people, Pharaoh's army and economy died due to his "hardened heart." In commemorating Passover's story, we sit at the dining table eating ritual foods and studying for hours. We teach of the struggles for justice that we pass from

generation to generation.

Fast forward through history, and we find that our people returned to Egypt and thrived in Persia. At the time of the Second Temple, the Alexandrian (Egypt) population included the second-largest Jewish population in the known world. Even as Rome destroyed the Jerusalem Temple, scattering Jews around the world, the Jewish population of Alexandria flourished for another millennium.

Having been carried into Persia at the First Temple's destruction, Jews continued to thrive for almost 2000 years. Babylonia was the home to the largest Jewish population in pre-modern history and served as the ultimate seat of Jewish Scholarship. The Babylonian Talmud holds greater out hority than the Jewiselem Talmud

authority than the Jerusalem Talmud.

Even experiencing the greatest of tragedies, our tradition reminds us that the ultimate Jewish teaching is always to choose life and blessing. We cannot always control what happens to us, but we have an obligation to turn our enemy into our friend and find ways to remember, "Just to be is a blessing. Just to live is holy." (Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel)


As we approach these holidays, our faith calls on us to take stock of the situations we allow to fester, the people from whom we have walked away (or allowed to walk from us), and most importantly, the blessings we look past because we get too stuck holding grudges. We cannot celebrate freedom until we free ourselves from carrying pain and free others from being judged by our past. Prophetically speaking, we all have lots to do – let's dive in together.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL UPDATE

Religious School at TOS is thriving. Our 7th grade community wide program, Shamor V'Zachor, is now meeting at Ohev, after several weeks at Chisuk Emuna. Led by Jenna Rappaport, Holocaust Educator, and our very own Jennie Baar, the program includes a weekly Holocaust Education component and Shabbat across denominations component lead by guest speakers.

This week at Shamor V'Zachor students learned about some of the major resistance movements that took place during the Holocaust including Abba Kovner in the Vilna ghetto and how word of his resistance figures spread to Warsaw and sparked a multi-months long fight as well as resistance fighting in death camps. They learned that young people were an integral part of resistance movements and were the foundation of some of the youth groups that still exist today. In their second hour, together students learned to braid challah with Rabbi Marley from the Dickinson College Hillel and about Harrisburg's BBYO from advisor Jason Cohen.

Shamor V'Zachor includes a Shabbaton celebrating Chloe Hjelm's Bat Mitzvah, a trip to the Holocaust Museum in D.C. on March 19th (parents and siblings over 13 are invited), entering the Schwab Holocaust Essay contest writing competition and The Reading of the Names ceremony on April 17th which is being held here this year.

Families of 4-7th graders attended informational Be Mitzvah meetings. Be Mitzvah dates and torah portions were shared with 4th and 5th graders' families, and much information was shared about protocols and expectations of the Be Mitzvah process. Great questions were asked, and many of the answers can now be found on the TOS website under the Learning tab: https://ohevsholom.org/learning/

The Education Committee, Chaired by Dr. Erika Saunders, is expanding! Two more parents of 2023 Be Mitzvah's, Mia Rosenberg and Jonathan Hjelm recently joined, and all members (not just parents) are invited to join the committee. Together, we are focusing on documentation, communication with the congregation, and programming. Of particular focus is sharing what happens each week in Religious School, and what's coming up. Expect new and improved ways to read about what we are doing and what we have planned for next year!

This week, the 3rd graders led by their teacher Deb Davidheiser, participated beautifully in Friday night service for Family Shabbat along with the Old World Folk Band. Their families also joined them at Religious School to create family gratitude books.

We recently celebrated Tu B'Shvat with an all-school learning and planting event, planned and presented by our talented faculty. On March 5th we will be at the JCC's annual Purim Carnival. Our annual Education Shabbat Service will be held on


Chloe Elizabeth Hjelm

There are so many ways in which each and every one of us live out social action every single day. It might be a small act, such as reaching out to a friend in need, or something larger, for example volunteering on a Saturday to pick up trash in a local neighborhood. Now our task is to come together and envision what greater social actions we can dedicate ourselves to as the community of Ohev Sholom. We are once again beginning an active social action committee here at the temple and your involvement is crucial to its success!

You may have noticed small actions firing up in the past couple months. These include starting a discussion with members of the Board of Trustees on what they would like social action within our temple to encompass; a sock donation drive in conjunction with Sisterhood and the Religious School to be donated to various shelters in the community and assisting in organizing the upcoming "Laugh Out Hate" comedy night, on Thurs. LAUGH OUT HATE EVENT CONNECTS COMMUNITY

A sell-out crowd of 150 people joined Temple Ohev Sholom for the first-ever Laugh Out Hate comedy night at the Federal Tap House in Harrisburg. The event brought together people from across the Harrisburg region to celebrate our diverse community. A huge shout out and thank you to the event planners which included Eve Emery, April Hutcheson, Dan Green, Andrea Grove, Marc Levy, and Barbara Plesco.

Comedians Eve Emery, Matt Moyer and Liz Glazer kept the audience laughing throughout the night, bringing their unique comedy styles to the stage. Eve had the audience laughing, drawing on her experiences as an ambulance worker. Matt, the comedian mayor of Harrisburg, used his brand of humor to show the connections between our communities. Liz, subbing in for Ariel Elias, had the audience rolling in laughter with her jokes about being raised as a Conservative Jew who went to an Orthodox Day School and is now married to a Reform Rabbi.

A portion of the proceeds from the event are being donated to Capital Rebirth, a Harrisburg-based non profit dedicated to uplifting and unifying Central Pennsylvania by providing community-oriented events and programs. This is a visionary group of young people who grew up here and want to give back.

Each year, Capital Rebirth holds a five-week flag football league for children in May that includes evening adult education on issues like financial literacy, personal safety and life skills. They had more than 100 families participate last year and expect even more this year.

Rabbi Kline announced Temple Ohev Sholom has agreed to host these adult education sessions at the synagogue as part of our ongoing social action efforts. This is a great opportunity to foster stronger community relationships and bring the spirit of Tikkun Olam to the greater Harrisburg community. The Sisterhood Brunch Program, originally scheduled for March, 2020, took place last month on Sunday January 22nd. A cadre of women from the Hadee Mosque Ladies Auxiliary were our invited guests for the morning.

The following blessing before brunch, composed by Rabbi Marc Kline and recited by Sisterhood Co-President, Reyna Jose, set the welcoming tone

for the morning:

"The Muslim and Jewish prayers before eating are most similar. We both praise God/El/Allah for providing us with food. Both imply a chain of people who prepared it, but recognize without God, none of it could have happened.

Baruch Atah - Allahomma bareek – we ask God's blessings as we share in this meal, and as we grow new relationships that will help each of us grow


as people of faith and love for our wider community."

Two representatives of the Auxiliary were interviewed by Sisterhood Co-President, Jeanette Krebs. In her warm and embracing style, Jeanette posed questions to them about their faith. They spoke eloquently about the cadence of their lives as devout Muslims. They shared that Judaism and Islam have patriarchs in common. Moses, they asserted, is mentioned more times in the Quran than is Mohammad. We learned that the Jewish faith and the Muslim faith have much in common. This is a beautiful platform from which to build an ongoing relationship as together we seek to make our corner of the world a better place.


Many dedicated Temple members offered their talents in the planning and execution of the Brunch program. Sisterhood is grateful to each and every one who helped to choreograph this event.

Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) to be commemorated with the "Reading of Names" program to be held at Temple Ohev Sholom

On Monday evening, April 17, 2023 at 7:30 pm, Yom Hashoah (Holocaust Memorial Day) will be commemorated with the "Reading of Names" program to be held at Temple Ohev Sholom. We hope that you and your family will be able to attend this special opening service and stay for a portion of the Reading of Names program.

In an effort to pass the torch of remembrance to the next generation, students from congregational Religious Schools and the Silver Academy will participate in the opening ceremony. They will also read names with their parents immediately following the opening ceremony. The Reading of Names is a vigil in which the names of those who perished during the Holocaust are read continuously over a period of 24 hours.

"Unto Every Person There is a Name" seeks to dignify the memories of victims of the Shoah (the Nazi Holocaust) by reading their names aloud. These victims were stripped of their names by their oppressors and tattooed with numbers. Through the public reading of the names of Holocaust victims, this program strives to restore a portion of their humanity and to retrieve them from the lost depths of anonymity. Temple Ohev Sholom's time slots for reading are Tuesday, April 18 from 3:00 am 4:30 am and from 1:30-3:30 pm.


