

MESSAGE FROM RABBI MARC

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel taught us, "Just to be is a blessing. Just to live is holy." Thousands of years earlier, Marcus Aurelius said, "When you arise in the morning, think of what a precious privilege it is to be alive - to breathe, to think, to enjoy, to love." Across millennia, the concept of being and blessing continues to infect and enrich the human soul.

Welcome to our new Jewish year. 5784 started off with wonderful energy in our sanctuary - it was/is a blessing to serve this community! People embraced and connected. You participated in bringing joy to the time we spent together and added to the holiness of the Holy Days



Over the course of the Holy Days, I spoke a lot about asking "WHY" questions. I firmly believe that no meaningful engagement can happen if we don't first understand why we are having it. I am blessed that many of you shared thoughts about my comments and liturgical choices. Not everyone agreed, but it was never about agreeing – it is always about engaging.

To that point, Audrey Miner and I want to invite you to a Congregational Brunch on Sunday, October 29 to begin our preparation of Temple Ohev Sholom's Long Range Plan. Our Board of Trustees has worked hard jogging with many of you in focus groups to begin laying to e tracks for our future trajectory. It is time to put some flesh on the bones. Over the course of the conversation, we will create by-laws that better match our practices and desired governance and financial structure. Ultimately, this process will inform the Rabbinic Search Committee as we begin the application for our next (and hopefully long-term) Rabbi.

There is a lot happening here. More people are getting more deeply involved. membership is growing. I am currently working with several people seeking conversion. Our calendar is full and the variety of activities available for diverse interests continues to blossom.

As we embark on my second year here, thank you for the trust, the energy, and the blessings. We still have a lot of work to do. Our building needs lots of attention if we intend to continue calling it our home. We need to intentionally develop our next generation of leaders. We must decide how and on what to focus a congregational mission and purpose.

As I said, we still have a lot to do and we need your commitment as we sift through presenting challenges, culling from the dross, the finest silver. Why? Because you matter. Because Reform Judaism matters. Because our community needs us to grow and thrive. As we walk together in the next stage of our transformation, we need to remember Max Lucado's teaching, "Gratitude lifts our eyes off the things we lack so we might see the blessings we possess." Let's feel blessed to have all that we have together, as family at Temple Ohev Sholom. See you on the 29th (and hopefully lots of times sooner!)!



TEMPLE OHEV SHOLOM FUNDS

Did you know that, like Sisterhood, Temple Ohev Sholom also has a variety of funds that can be contributed to for any occasion? OLD WORLD FOLK BAND

Klezmer music has its origins in Europe among the Ashkenazi Jews. The word is a Yiddish contraction of the Hebrew words for instrument (kley) and song (zemer). This traditional folk music borrows inspiration from the melodies that define Jewish prayer, the music of the Roma peoples, European folk music, and classical music. The essential elements of the tradition include dance tunes. ritual melodies, and improvisations played for listening, weddings and other social functions. As the music arrived in the United States, it lost some of its traditional ritual elements and adopted elements of American big band popular music in the 1920s-1930s and remained a popular musical genre until the early 1950s. Klezmer music began to be popularized again in the late 1970s and early 1980s during what is known as the Klezmer revival. It

was during the time in May 1982 that the Old World Folk Band (OWFB) was born.

A history of the band can be found on its outdated website, https://www.oldworldfolkband.org/ (which needs to be updated as the dates and times of performances are inaccurate). Many of the band's tunes can be found on YouTube under, "Old World Folk Band" as well as additional information in Google.

For the past 15 years, the OWFB has called Ohev Sholom home, holding rehearsals in the Lehrman Chapel and playing occasional Friday evening Shabbat services. The band has always welcomed musicians to "sit in"

and learn the music, some of whom later became band members.

We are interested in continuing the tradition of Klezmer music and creating a legacy for the Temple Ohev Sholom family by extending an invitation to anyone who is musically inclined to join us at a rehearsal with or without your instrument.
