PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Every day, since October 7, 2023, I wake up and remember the news. I think about Israel, and the people that I know who live there, the people that I love who have family members there, and I grieve, and I am scared. I am scared for them, and I am scared for us. The failures of so many governments, institutions, countries, businesses, to say something scares me. The failures of friends and family to even acknowledge what is going on scares me. Hamas is a terrorist organization that wants to eliminate the Jews. The conflation of Hamas with the liberation of Palestine is dangerous. Propaganda is real and appears to be working. Silence is not an option. We can and we must use our voices to denounce terrorism.



I do not want to live scared. That's not a way to live. I was talking to my son the other day and he felt guilty for watching sports (Go Eagles! Go Phillies!) but he recognized that there is a comfort that they bring. We need to take comfort where we can. We need to live proudly Jewish, whatever that means for you.

As we navigate these uncertain times, it becomes more and more evident to me that our strength lies in our Ohev community. I saw how we came together at the Israel Solidarity Gathering & Vigil and the Unity Shabbat of Greater Harrisburg. Ohev members were omnipresent. In the face of these trying times, our Ohev family comes together. I am proud of being Jewish and I am inspired by the Ohev community and the Central PA Jewish community.

The Jewish people are resilient. Temple Ohev Sholom is resilient. It is important for those of us who are Jewish along with members of our congregational family of different faiths and backgrounds, to unite and be proud of who we are. For those of us who are Jewish and those of us who may be of different faiths. It is equally important to keep Jewish joy in our lives.

Temple Ohev Sholom can help you do just that. How, you might ask? There are, of course, the weekly Friday night Shabbat services. There is the Temple Ohev Sholom Book Club. There are the Mini-University offerings. And let's not forget the choir or Tuesdays coffee & conversations at Elementary Coffee! There is even a motorcycle club. MESSAGE FROM RABBI MARC

Re-printing with permission from Rabbi Marc Kline, Message from Unity Shabbat on Friday, October 13, 2023

Last night, the five major Jewish congregations in Greater Harrisburg, PA came together to welcome Shabbat. It was the first time anyone could remember everyone coming together for worship. We held each other as we prayed that the blessings of Shabbat peace could infect the world – especially now.

No one postured. No one said that we had to enforce or overcome the presumed and imposed traditional hierarchies that too often separate the Jewish



world. We prayed and shared. The engagement culminated as the joint choir of the entire breadth of our Jewish community intoned the words of Shalom Alaechem. We implored the ministering angels to bring us the renewed spirit to bring healing to the world. While I cannot say that it was a joyous evening, I can say that we universally appreciated sharing these sacred moments across the community. I can also say that many of us want to make this happen for joyous ceremonies moving forward, not just in the times we need each other's consolation.

The actual service ended as we sang "Hatikvah." Here are my words

introducing our eternal prayer of hope:

Long before there was a State of Israel in the modern world, there was "Hatikvah." Hatikvah is Hebrew for "The Hope." The song is an amalgamation and evolution of poems and melodies that crossed the European and Asian continents that dates back to the Spanish Inquisition. Even then, it was a song of hope for the world's renewal, as we intoned the melody praying for dew to quench the earth's thirst.

Twenty-five-year-old Naftali Herz Imber wrote the poem in 1856. The full poem "Tikvateinu (Our Hope)" contains nine stanzas. In 1895, editors pulled the

first stanza from the poem; these words are the lyrics we know today.

The song did not become the State of Israel's national anthem until November 10, 2004. I learned to sing it as a child in religious school. When the Allied forces liberated Bergen-Belsen, British Jewish Chaplain Leslie Hardman filmed the "choir of human skeletons" intone Hatikvah – April 20, 1945.

There has always been Hatikvah. It is a song more prayerfully Jewish than any prayer in our traditional liturgy. It confirms the inextinguishable hope that drives our souls. The Torah teaches us that in every case, whichever the circumstance, "U'v'charta b'chayim – always choose life." Despite the degradations, the pogroms, and the mass slaughter, we are prisoners of hope.

Aeli Aeli – sh'lo yigamer l'aolam – My God, My God, these shall never end – the sand of the sea, the rush of waters, the lightning of the heavens – and the

human prayer. Hatikvah. Amidst it all, we choose life.

Our history is rife with attempts to destroy us. For every perpetrator, we read about them in history books while we continue to make history. We choose life.

At the same time, we must choose life for everyone else. The ultimate hope is not just for us, but for "US – the whole world." Killing more people will not bring back the dead I love who just yesterday held my hands and my dreams

for the future.

Especially amidst our pain and outrage, we must remember that the Messianic Age is not about us – it is about the "world us." And we learn that in a world where no one behaves like a human, we must always be humane. Amidst it all, we choose life.


Dr. King taught us, "Hate cannot drive out hate, only love can do that." Rabbi Menachem Creditor gives us this teaching a little differently - Olam Chesed Yibaneh – we need to build this world through love, compassion, and hope. In facing the world, even in its darkest moments, we hold onto each other, welcome Shabbat and choose life.

Abraham Joshua Heschel taught us, "Just to be is a blessing. Just to live is holy." Hope is the holy foundation upon which we build our dreams for peace and justice.

We are prisoners of hope. Hatikva – the eternal Jewish affirmation that so long as we breathe, we hope. So long as we are, we summon the courage and the love to make the day that is into the tomorrow for which we pray.

IMPORTANT UPDATES: TEMPLE OHEV SHOLOM DUES & PAYMENT PLATFORM

By the time you are reading the November newsletter, you should have received the following email with regards to Temple Ohev Sholom's new software application, ShulCloud. For those of you who may not receive or read emails, we are including the message here as it contains important information.

Dear Temple Ohev Sholom Members,

We hope this message finds you well. As we transition into the new year, we would like to share some important updates regarding membership dues and our new membership platform, Shul Cloud, which is used by over 1300 Jewish Temples. We believe these updates will enhance our experience as members of this vibrant community. These updates do not involve any increase in dues.

Introducing Shul Cloud:

We are moving away from PayPal for online payments and introducing our new integrated platform, Shul Cloud. Shul Cloud will provide each member with a personalized online account portal where you can conveniently manage your membership, payments and more.

This link [LINK] is personalized for you, [NAME], and after clicking it, you will be brought to our new portal and prompted to set a password of your choosing for accessing your Shul Cloud account going forward. Please review the rest of this email, then come back to this link to configure your account, your payment preferences and pay any outstanding dues. We have attached your current dues statement to this email. Any payments received through Sept 22, 2023 should be reflected in these statements.

After setting your username and password, you can always get back to the portal from our website at https://ohevsholom.org by clicking the Payments button in the menu.

Key Features of Shul Cloud:

- **1. Payment Options:** Through your Shul Cloud portal, you can securely save your e-Check information or credit card details. Both payment methods can be used for dues payments, religious school fees, donations such as the Kol Nidre Appeal, memorial books, and more. Payments can also now be scheduled and automatic, making it more convenient for you.
- **2. Member Account Management:** You will have the ability to view and edit your contact information, including updating your mailing address, phone number, and email. You can also view and manage your important dates, like yahrzeits and other significant events, as well as your mailing list subscriptions.
- **3. Online Member Directory:** Shul Cloud will provide you with access to a new online member directory. You can choose what information you would like to share with other members and configure your preferences according to your comfort level. This is in addition to the paper membership directory.

Changes to Billing Cycle:

Historically, Temple Ohev Sholom's billing cycle has spanned ten months from July through April. Starting this year, we have made the decision to shift our billing cycle. Therefore, the billing cycle for this year (2023-2024) will be from September through June for accounts billed

monthly. Accounts billed at the beginning of the year will still show a July 1 invoice date. This change sets us up for a 12-month billing cycle next year.

12-Month Billing Cycle:

We are excited to inform you that, in the coming year, we will be transitioning to a 12-month billing cycle, starting from July 2024 through June 2025. This change will allow for lower monthly dues invoices and more flexibility for all of our members.

We are confident that Shul Cloud will streamline your experience with Temple Ohev Sholom and offer a more user-friendly and efficient platform for managing your membership and payments.

We have set up a dedicated support address, support@ohevsholom.org, for any questions or issues you may have while configuring your account.

We are also offering 5 in-person sessions over the course of October during which we can help set up your account with you (please bring your laptop, tablet, or phone, the larger the screen the easier).

If you are unable to attend any of these sessions, you can also contact the office for support setting up your account or configuring your automatic payments.

We recognize that not all members are active internet users. Some of you may prefer to receive your communications as physical mail, and that's alright too. Let us know if you prefer physical mail by responding to this email or calling the office, and we will continue to send you paper invoices. If your bank already automatically mails your checks to the office, that's great too, and you are not required to use the portal for payments.

We appreciate your patience and understanding as we implemented these changes over the summer and fall. There will still be bumps along the way, but our goal is to enhance your experience as a valued member of Temple Ohev Sholom and to provide you with the tools and resources you need to stay connected with our community.

Thank you for your continued support, and we look forward to a wonderful year ahead.





RELIGIOUS SCHOOL UPDATE

The October 7th massacre in Israel and subsequent fighting continues to weigh heavily on all of us. At Religious School we have addressed the war in age-appropriate ways. In the K-3rd grade group, almost every single child used the word happy to describe how they felt in that moment, it was clear they were oblivious to current events. And it was a wonderful testament to the environment our faculty has cultivated for them. I let them know that when they, or the adults around them are upset, they have the power to help. I proceeded to teach them two ways to change their own or others' mindsets when they're feeling unhappy, scared, anxious or angry. Butterfly hugs and deep



breathing techniques help people of all ages, you may want to learn about them on your own. Both are trauma-informed methods to reset one's brain. I explained that people in Israel were having a hard time and not feeling great and that one way they can help is by sending messages of encouragement and support to them. They happily colored in many pictures which were immediately scanned and sent to Israel to be placed in care packages along with gluten free foods for soldiers.

The older students were not very different. When asked how they felt, most children said positive things, and only a few were worried because "there's a war in Israel". They shared what they knew, which was very basic: Israel is at war, and there are hostages. We talked a little bit about how everyone in Israel serves in the army, and that when they are finished, they are in the reserves. Some kids talked about having visited Israel, knowing people there, family in Israel, and how afraid the hostages must be. I concluded by also teaching them how to do butterfly hugs and breathing techniques.

My conversations met the kids where they are at and was a safe space to share their feelings. We encouraged them to always share their feelings with their families. Below are articles that may help you continue this conversation with children should you wish to do so:



OLD WORLD FOLK BAND



Klezmer music has its origins in Europe among the Ashkenazi Jews. The word is a Yiddish contraction of the Hebrew words for instrument (kley) and song (zemer). This traditional folk music borrows inspiration from the melodies that define Iewish prayer, the music of the Roma peoples, European folk music, and classical music. The essential elements of the tradition include dance tunes, ritual melodies, and improvisations played for listening, weddings and other social functions. As the music arrived in the United States, it lost some of its traditional ritual elements and adopted elements of American big band popular music in the 1920s-1930s and remained a popular musical genre until the early 1950s. Klezmer music began to be popularized again in the late 1970s and early 1980s during

what is known as the Klezmer revival. It was during the time in May 1982

that the Old World Folk Band (OWFB) was born.

A history of the band can be found on its outdated website, https://www.oldworldfolkband.org/ (which needs to be updated as the dates and times of performances are inaccurate). Many of the band's tunes can be found on YouTube under, "Old World Folk Band" as well as additional information in Google.

For the past 15 years, the OWFB has called Ohev Sholom home, holding rehearsals in the Lehrman Chapel and playing occasional Friday evening Shabbat services. The band has always welcomed musicians to "sit in"


