
We need you now.

MESSAGE FROM RABBI MARC

So much of our attention gets drawn overseas every day. What began as a nightmarish act of terror has become a prolonged conflict, destroying more lives and property. Systemic anti-Semitism is patent and, perhaps because of the war, has overshadowed any of the horror stories of thousands who are dead, severely injured, still held hostage, or the reality that our lives are forever altered. We know that we are facing greater concerns for our sanctity and security. Our new community engagement serves us to keep us in the community conversation so that it does not happen at us or without us.



We must also stay mindful that we have a synagogue that has been here for over 170 years and want to continue growing it for the next 170 years. Torah teaches us, *u'v'charta b'chayim* – always choose life. Our synagogue's evolution is more prescient now than it has ever been. Who are we? Why do we need to exist? What should our future look like? How is Judaism evolving, and what does it mean for us as a synagogue in the Jewish community and the wider Harrisburg community? I am not an alarmist but given the national trend of closing “iconic” houses of worship, we must have an existential conversation. We have added over double-digit new affiliated families just this fiscal year. We have produced successful and innovative programming. People are finding their way into deeper involvement. We must have direction and focus to sustain energy.

Plan on joining us on December 3 during religious school. We will share brunch and visioning thoughts leading us to a future plan and relevantly crafted new by-laws. We will discuss “big picture” topics about mission, “branding,” finances, governance, and affiliation. We will not get it all covered that day, but our goal is to get far enough to allow our leadership team to synthesize our conversation and point us in the right direction. We owe our Board of Trustees a great deal of appreciation for the incredible distance we have already traveled this past year plus. I also want to publicly thank Alan Stolberg, Marty Rogoff, Steve Neiman, Chad Harvey, and April Hutcheson for their hands-on help and guidance in keeping our journey on track.

I've never been much of an athlete. Frankly, I never had a desire to run or even lift heavy things. But that all changed about 12 years ago when I wanted to lose some weight from my 3rd pregnancy. I laced up a pair of beat-up sneakers and just went out and moved for a little bit. I certainly didn't look like a runner, and I wasn't fast. But it felt great to get out there without having to think about my next move.

Fast forward to 2020, I ran my very first Marathon in Disney World. I was asked to join my cousin as it was her 40th birthday and wanted some company. It was a bucket list item for me, so I started training using the Peloton App and a treadmill. As a mom

of 6, never would I have thought I could do this. I don't look like a runner, let alone an athlete. I am not fast at all, but that is okay. It's one foot in front of the other that is forward! I finished that marathon with the biggest smile and went back for more in 2022! I ran in the Dopey Challenge (5k, 10k, 1/2 Marathon, and full Marathon). I crossed all four finish lines and all 6 of my kids were there to watch as I finished the Marathon.

In the fall of 2022, I requested to be a member of Team DetermiNation and run on behalf of The American Cancer Society at Disney World. I have always been involved with them since I lost both of my parents to cancer. As part of that team, I went back to Disney and in 2023 completed the Marathon Weekend 5k and the Half Marathon. This year, I'm proud to represent Team DetermiNation in Disney as I attempt a second run at the Dopey Challenge in January 2024!

I continue to run because it makes me smile and enjoy the world. It gets me out of my head and takes stress away (even just for a small amount of time). 

THE BIRTH OF *Reform Judaism*

From its modest beginnings in Charleston during the 1820s, the Reform movement developed into the predominant form of American Judaism.

The arrival of tens of thousands of Jewish immigrants from central Europe, along with German-trained rabbis who brought European ideas about religious reform, initiated debates about how to preserve Jewish identity in American society. Propelled by the belief that Judaism would not survive without adapting to its new surroundings, Jewish reformers considered how much tradition to retain and what changes to introduce into American synagogues.

Did you know that, like Sisterhood, Temple Ohev Sholom also has a variety of funds that can be contributed to for any occasion? - **Diana Sauertieg Beautification Fund** - this fund is used to pay for indoor and outdoor beautification projects for the Temple buildings and grounds.
- **Mildred Hand Library Fund** - provides funding for books and periodicals for the Temple Library.
- **Rabbi's Discretionary Fund** - contributions to this fund allows the Rabbi to direct their usage at their discretion according to fund guidelines set by the URJ.
- **Religious Education Fund** - contributions to this fund will be used to provide religious school scholarship assistance to families in financial need.
- **Robert and Francine Brenner Sacred Music Fund** - helps the Temple cover the costs for Cantorial/music services.
- **Robert Woldorf Youth Fund** - provides funding for educational programs for Temple youth.
- **Steven M. Harpster Tikkun Olam Fund** - to help fund various social action activities at the Temple.
- **Temple Fund** - Money in this fund is used to supplement the Temple expenses for projects, budgetary items, and other needs.
- **Youth Activities Fund** - Provides funding to assist Temple Youth Group programs.
- **Randy Disend Fund** - provides funding to assist Rabbi with Confirmation class annual trip to the Religious Action Center in D.C.
