BUILD, BOND & BAGELS...

A BREAKFAST TO BUILD OUR FUTURE

On December 3rd, more than 100 congregants came together for the first "Build, Bond & Bagels" breakfast workshop. This was the first in a series of workshops designed to help our Temple Ohev Sholom family come together and determine our future path.

In this first session, participants worked to answer the question, "What are our core values?" Smaller groups brainstormed on what the congregation as a whole value, and then came together as a larger group to share the results. Interestingly enough, there were common threads across generations that proved our commonality.

Thanks to the help of Marty Rogoff, Alan Stolberg and each table captain our core values can be described as:

- 1. Honoring our Jewish heritage for today and for the future
- 2. A congregational culture of belonging
- 3. Inclusivity and diversity
- 4. Tikkun Olam -- healing the world
- 5. Lifelong learning

We therefore commit to:

- 1. Honoring Jewish heritage and tradition by:
- Gathering in inspirational worship that is rooted in Jewish tradition and enhanced with contemporary prayer, music, art, and teaching;
- Communicating and modeling a vision of peace and security for Jewish people here, in Israel, and throughout the world;
- Enabling pride in being part of a Jewish community and engaging Jewish values to shape congregants' lives, actions, and commitments;
- Empowering all congregants to access Jewish tradition, to navigate their own Jewish paths; and
- Ensuring there is an authentic way to be a Reform Jew in the Greater Harrisburg community.
- 2. Providing a supportive environment for all congregants, by:
- Prioritizing a sense of "belonging" within the congregation;
- Ensuring that congregants of all ages feel a connection to the Temple as their spiritual home;

- Offering meaningful opportunities for all to socialize, engage, and connect;
- Supporting one another in times of joy, in times of need, and moments in between; and
- Sustaining a culture of mutual respect among clergy, staff, congregants, and lay leaders.

3. Promoting inclusivity and diversity, by:

- Welcoming all people into Temple Ohev Sholom;
- Encouraging participation from all who seek a connection to Jewish life regardless of religious background or expression of faith, race, ethnicity, gender, gender identity, ability, age, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, or political affiliation;
- Engaging non-Jewish spouses, partners, and relatives in congregational life and worship;
- Promoting dignity in programming and in action; and
- Offering a safe and accessible place to worship and to be Jewish.

4. Working to heal the world, by:

- Focusing on acts of kindness inside the Synagogue and out;
- Caring for the Greater Harrisburg Community through active involvement;
- Combating antisemitism through education and activism; and
- Fighting for justice, sustenance, and dignity for all people.

5. Creating and cultivating a culture of lifelong learning, by:

- Delivering engaging educational opportunities that are meaningful and relevant for congregants at each stage of life;
- Providing opportunities to exchange ideas and gain new insights and perspectives; and
- Serving as a resource for non-Jews to learn about Judaism.

The next session, Build, Bond & Bagels ... The Other Half, will take place from 9am to noon, January 14th, 2024 in Sisterhood Hall. This session will focus on our mission, vision and objectives. All are welcome, even if you were not able to attend the first session. Your input is welcome and valued.

MESSAGE FROM RABBI MARC

Welcome to 2024. The art Marc Chagall wrote, "We are not a people that dies ... I know it is difficult to find the balm which could heal our body and our soul. But perhaps it will do us good to kindle freely the lights of our own treasures and then sing freely in all the hues with which they were born. They will follow us in this world as a shadow that is no shadow at all – it is the Jew within us. It becomes abundantly clear that the freer we are, the more Jewish we are. And the more Jewish we are, the more human we become."

Over thousands of years, our tradition has demonstrated incredible tenacity. Our commitment to Torah and its morality continues to situationally evolve. Circumstances



may change warranting different answers but the ethos demanding that we dignify humanity never wavers. I cannot imagine "doing Judaism" the way my grandparents did, but I can also never imagine not "doing Judaism." As Chagall put it, our humanity depends on our commitment to our faith tradition. Where we see the world failing, each of us must look inward and remember that Judaism requires us to be "orae lagoyim – lights to the nations." This does not mean that we are better than anyone else; it means that irrespective of how others behave, we must always strive to be human. Torah obligates us to be exemplars, demonstrating that faith matters – that living faithfully can change the world. Faith is not rooted in rituals. Rituals are important for they keep us grounded. No, this admonition is a clarion call to the many of us who live on the fringe of our religions to dive in, study what tradition really teaches about faith and security, and move past the fear, ignorance, and apathy that clouds too many of our life choices.

The world around is crazy. People are making knee jerk responses to pieces of stories they learn from sound-bite social media. We cannot change the world with more soundbites. That said, before we can use our faith to engage folks, we need to be secure in the values of who we are and what our faith has to say about building and respecting community. We are not asking people to become Jewish. We are imploring people to become more faithful in whatever their tradition. It will make being human more valuable.

We host lots of opportunities to grow and engage at Temple Ohev Sholom, join with us in study, worship, growing the spirit of our community, and celebrating the blessings of our humanity. Freely singing in the hues that our being together generates, we are enjoying "doing Judaism," and, as our congregation continues to grow, I guess others are enjoying doing it with us.

Rabbi Marc Aaron Kline, J.D., D.D. Judgment may well up as a wall of water, but Righteousness is the mightiest of rivers.



RELIGIOUS SCHOOL UPDATE

I hope that this newsletter finds everyone healthy, and that the hostages will have been freed and that the end of Israel's war is imminent. Whatever the circumstances, as a people I know that we will be in mourning for quite some time. I hope that you find some solace in giving your child the gift of a Jewish education. The continuity of our people depends on our children.



Before telling you about Religious School, I'd like to share a meaningful experience I had at Governor Shapiro's Chanukah gathering. I was honored to have

been one of the only non-clergy Harrisburgers invited. I joined the hundreds of prominent Jewish Pennsylvanians from across the state for a truly special evening. As my parents would say, I was among the big machers which is Yiddish for big wigs. To eat traditional Jewish foods like latkes and donuts and newer ones like tahini shakes from Goldie's in Philadelphia in the Mansion was a treat. We were serenaded by the University of Pennsylvania's Shabbatones, a student led acapella group that would be performing at the White House the next day. Governor Shapiro asked us to reflect on the significance of celebrating our holiday, and the lighting of a menorah gifted by the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, in our country's seat of democracy. Four survivors of the October 7th attack lit the menorah and Governor Shapiro led everyone in singing Maoz Tzur. To feel that warmth and solidarity in the public space of the Governor's mansion was powerful. I hope that each and every one of you has found the support that you needed during this holiday and that Temple Ohev Sholom has played a role in your restoration.

At Religious School, our children received Chanukah goody bags from Sisterhood and enjoyed a wonderful Chanukah program created by Julie Goddard, our fantastic 5th grade teacher. Teachers supported by parents led them through the fun-filled activities. Afterwards, our 6th and 7th graders participated in the Better Together Chanukah program for teens and seniors. They learned how to use fondant, icing, sprinkles, and their imaginations to create beautiful donuts to celebrate Hanukkah with. They learned that in Israel, bakeries and cafes go all out on designer donuts. We look forward to even more seniors attending our next program on January 7th where we are going to do a painting activity involving an acrylic pour, thematic analysis, and guided painting and storytelling. The participating adults continue to tell me how much they enjoy interacting with our students, and our students are pushed out of their comfort zones while they build intergenerational relationships. It is a mitzvah (good deed) all around.

RABBINIC SEARCH COMMITTEE

Dear Friends:

The Rabbinic Search Committee ("Committee") is re-engaging to begin the process of recruiting our settled rabbi. "Settled rabbi" is the phrase used to describe a rabbi hired at the conclusion of an interim rabbi's term. We're richly blessed by Rabbi Marc Kline's tenure with us, and we'll continue to benefit from his experience, wisdom, and guidance until he leaves us in June 2025.

The strategic planning process undertaken by the congregation, starting with the December 3 working session, will chart Temple Ohev Sholom's path forward. This process will also inform preparation of job application materials to be posted on the Central Conference of American Rabbis website in early October 2024.

Between now and then, Committee members will consult with the Temple Ohev Sholom Board of Trustees and Rabbi Kline to finalize a job description and produce CCAR-required reports and other deliverables. We will also issue periodic updates to the congregation. Since the bulk of the Committee's work will occur once candidate resumes are received, our activity updates prior to next fall may be a bit lean, but we will keep you informed.



UNION FOR REFORM JUDAISM'S 150TH

This past weekend I attended the Union for Reform Judaism's conference in Washington D.C. celebrating 150 years of Reform Judaism. Before I share, I would be remiss not to mention how delightful it was to connect with other Jewish

professionals from my past.

I learned so much about the Reform movement in general and, specifically, about how the movement is responding to the attacks of October 7th. Instead of waiting until next month, when I've processed all of this information, I am sharing some of the highlights that struck me as profound and relevant to our congregation

in the hopes that you discuss these points and find strength in them.

Every speaker addressed the atrocities that occurred in Israel on October 7th and prayed for the return of the hostages. The overarching message was that URJ stands with Israel who must defend itself and protect our people. At the same time, there was another message: now more than ever we need a big tent to include everyone's opinions. The president of the URJ, Rabbi Rick Jacobs, compared the situation to the advice we get on an airplane; we should first put on our own mask, then help our child, and then help our neighbor. He also said:

• We must be able to hold two thoughts at once, e.g. concern for Palestinians as well as Israelis. Put another way, we must hold competing truths together for the safety and security of our people. We were reminded that many of the victims and hostages

were peace activists, and we must pick up where they left off.

• A two-state solution, however remote, is the only solution.

• To prevail we must eliminate Hamas and, at the same time, care for Palestinian civilians.

• We must stand shoulder to shoulder with Israelis and be able to criticize the Israeli

government

• We should recognize that the humanitarian disaster is causing intense generational conflict. We should remember that we taught our children the value of social justice. We need to keep educating them with facts that demonstrate how complicated this conflict is – seeking justice for everyone involved.

• Though our hearts are heavy, they are still beating. We must rebuild the shattered lives of Israelis and help them regain trust in their institutions by helping them fill

the anticipated governmental void.

- Zionism is the commitment to building an Israel that strives for the betterment of all humanity. We (URJ) are the strongest Zionist movement in North America and our Zionist family is living through the most traumatic time of our generation.
- We need to remind the world that we have a 3,000-year connection to the land of Israel. We are part of the land, and it is part of us.
- We must maintain our Jewish solidarity and be a light into nations, including our own.

At the conference, I was repeatedly reminded that in one of the group interviews I had for my Religious School position, I was asked what I would bring to the table. I immediately shared that my experience of living in Israel for five-plus years would enhance the Israel education we provide to our children. I was asked to explain why Israel education is an important part of Jewish education. I don't remember what I said, but everything I heard this weekend reinforced its

importance. This generation must learn that Israel is family.

Other presenters made complementary points in powerful language. During the session about coalition building, Reverend Dr. Jacqui Lewis said the following:

- We must live with the nuance of 'both and", that we should see the present as "dynamic tension" and that we must ask, "What kind of ancestors does the future need from us?"
- This is a vulnerable moment for Jews and Israel. We must have radical love to combat baseless hatred. Our wounds & blessings are the lens through which we see life. We only heal through love.
- Life is hard, and adversity comes. Religion offers us a connection to community and to self. Spiritual tradition teaches that we are all created b'Tzelem Elohim (in God's image) which reminds us both to love ourselves and that we are all interconnected. So, love yourself hard! You are a gift from the universe. Love your neighbor as you love yourself. I need you, and you need me.

Lutheran Pastor Nadia Bolz-Weber is the Founder of House of Sinners and Saints and a former comic. As a leader, she is "anti-excellence, and proparticipation." She has democratized every aspect of her church's services. Her approach reminded me of how very hard Ohev's lay leaders have been working to strengthen every aspect of our

congregation. She also had us ponder the idea that friendly is not the same as welcoming. And, like Rabbi Marc, she is a firm believer in building inclusive coalitions. She continued, that we must see everyone's humanity before anything else, even in these "desperate hot mess times". It's harder but more important than ever to recognize everyone's humanity. She uses humor and grace to heal our broken world and believes that we can find at least one thing in common with everyone.

The Sikh presenter had just one message: We must do everything through love. He doubled down and stated that power is not the answer, nor is salvation: it is leading with love.

The keynote speaker was none other than Second Man, Doug Emhoff, who answered many questions with "I'm just a kid from Central Jersey" and "how crazy is it that the President knows my name?" His message to us was clear. Although he had no intention of speaking out against hatred and Anti Semitism, his wife, Vice-President Kamala Harris, insisted that he do so. They both encourage us to wear our Jewish symbols proudly and not to retreat from our rituals.

Much of the conference was devoted to URJ's values and working sessions to help us envision the next 50 years. I was proud that at the Build, Bagel, Beyond gathering we recently held at Ohev Sholom, approximately a hundred congregants, including our 7th grade students, gathered to begin this important work. When asked about the strengths of our Temple, I talked about our committed board, our inclusive and welcoming members, our social justice warriors, and the overall collaborative spirit I have experienced in the past year and a half. I don't know when the conference will be held next, but I strongly encourage everyone, be they Jewish professionals, lay leaders, or members of our wonderful congregation, to attend and have your spirits lifted at this powerful gathering.
