#### Ohev Sholom 2024 Results of Strategic Workshops

#### **Core Values**

As Harrisburg's oldest synagogue and only Reform Congregation, Temple Ohev Sholom espouses and commits to these five Core Values:

- 1. Honoring our Jewish heritage today and in the future.
- 2. Cultivating a congregational culture of belonging.
- 3. Being committed to inclusivity and diversity.
- 4. Healing the world Tikkun Olam.
- 5. Facilitating lifelong learning.

#### 1. Honoring Jewish heritage and tradition by:

- Gathering in worship that is rooted in Jewish tradition and enhanced with contemporary prayer, music, art, and teaching.
- Creating inspiring worship experiences that enrich our spiritual lives both personally and communally.
- Communicating and modeling the vision that the Jewish people (here, in Israel, and throughout the world) will live in peace and security with our neighbors.
- Enabling congregants to feel pride in being part of a Jewish community and to engage Jewish values to shape their lives, actions, and commitments.
- Empowering congregants to access Jewish tradition and to navigate their own Jewish paths.
- Ensuring an authentic way to be a Reform Jew in the Greater Harrisburg community; and offering a safe place to be a Jew.

- Prioritizing a sense of "belonging" within a congregation that knows each member personally, building deep and enduring friendships.

- Supporting one another in times of joy, in times of need, and moments in between; and
- Sustaining a culture of respect among clergy, staff, and lay leaders.

- Providing opportunities to exchange ideas and gain new insights and perspectives.
- Interpreting traditions through the lens of our changing world; and

# **MESSAGE FROM RABBI MARC**

Near the beginning of the Book of Ecclesiastes, we read, "Vanity, vanities – all is vanity. What does man gain for his labor under the sun?" We read these words during Sukkot, just as the world will go to sleep. We must stop and measure the value of all the things we hold on to as sacred and most important. Over the winter, the world will change. What will we cling to; what will we let go? It will be only months until we will again experience the warmth of the sun, and yet the words of the Psalmist ring loudly, "A thousand years is but a watch in the night – the span of a life but a blink of an eye." In God's terms, this year of tremendous change is a blip on the radar. For each of us, sometimes it feels like an eternity.



As we approach March, we will experience the end of winter and, for many, cabin fever; the culmination of college basketball's year; the beginning of baseball; college acceptance letters are coming in; recitals are in full bloom (as are our bushes, trees, and lawns); and the real estate market hits full stride. If someone ever wanted to know what evolution looks like, one need only look around and palpably feel it happening all around us. Healthy plants survive and thrive. Healthy teams excel. A year of preparation plays out in field excellence, stellar exam scores, and magnificent artistry. Emotionally, we are not the same people we were as the earth went into its winter hibernation. We have said last farewells and first welcomes. Even though some of us have experienced heartbreak and pain, many more shared new and renewed "I love yous."

In this time of renewal, we celebrate Purim and prepare for Passover. Despite the ultimately troubling story of Esther, we glean from the book a most prescient mandate and moral. We are responsible for everything that happens. We determine how to celebrate and prepare for both life and death. We make the choice to spend the extra energy to study, practice, rehearse, serve, and love – or not. Ultimately, we learn that there is no greater force for changing the world than the blood running through our veins and the hearts and minds it feeds and nurtures. Ultimately, we own the privilege and opportunity to heal dysfunction and celebrate blessings. We know that change can be inconvenient and sometimes painful. Therapy forces us to acknowledge the roots of our scars before it opens the door for renewal. This time of the earth's renewal provides us with the atmosphere and resources to bring out the even better "me" residing in each of our souls.

Next month is Passover – the time we celebrate freedom from bondage and oppression. Let's use this month to prepare ourselves so that when the waters part, we are ready to dance through them.

# RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS







#### **PURIM**

We have entered the Hebrew month of Adar, this is our "happy" month because it includes Purim. We are commanded to celebrate (yes, to get tipsy!) Here are the ways in which we are celebrating:

Mishloach Manot, the giving gifts of prepared foods to your friends and neighbors. In some communities this has become an elaborate ritual, in other communities Tzedakah is given in lieu of gifts. This year, Religious School will collect and send Tzedakah to Israel via two terrific organizations:

In October, Religious School students made cards and sent messages that were distributed to displaced persons and soldiers in Israel who are receiving Gluten free meals prepared by volunteers who saw the need and took action. Learn more about them here: Wheat free Warrior Network or donate to them here: Donate

FIDF supports Lone Soldiers, defined as someone who has made Aliyah (moved to Israel) without their family. These soldiers are often very young, in their teens and 20's. As they assimilate into a new language and culture, they are conscripted as required by Israeli law. You can help them provide these young defenders of Israel with:

- Emergency medical supplies to save lives in the field
- PTSD therapy to care for soldiers who have experienced atrocities unimaginable
- Financial assistance for families living below the poverty line with a breadwinner called up to reserve duty
- Hygiene kits to soldiers that were called to serve without a moment's notice
- Care packages for wounded soldiers and the families of our fallen heroes
- By donating here: Lone Soldier Support

Religious School will continue an old tradition: baking **Hamantaschen** and starting a new one: **A Purim costume contest**, both on **March 10th (yes, we need parents to help make this a smooth and fun baking experience!)** 

The Purim Carnival at the JCC on March 24th. There will be no Religious School. Everyone is invited and encouraged to attend or volunteer at the Purim Carnival.

Did you know that this is the 13th year of the **Annual Women's Megillah Reading?** Long time Jewish community member Marian Frankston organizes this incredible event in which I have proudly participated in every year except the one held during a snowstorm. I am extending an invitation to all TOS women (yes, only women, I don't make the rules) to come and witness this unique tradition. It will be held on Sunday, March 24, 2024 at 9 o'clock a.m. sharp, at the old JCC, 3301 N. Front St. If you cannot make it but have an idea or a great costume for me, please let me know. These women are as serious about their costumes as they are about their readings!



Better Together is a free program generously funded by a grant that aims to conquer loneliness and isolation through intergenerational Jewish programming. **Empty nesters and teens** (grades 5-12) make connections, learn about others, and have fun together. If you have not joined us, it's not too late to join us!

**February's Better Together Krav Maga** event was fantastic! Led by a former IDF officer and her fellow enthusiasts, we learned some of the ways we can defend ourselves from attackers. Joelle Gozlan patiently explained, demonstrated, and had us practice multiple moves that could save us from harm. On March 10th, 12-2, Better Together celebrates PURIM with Costumes and Chesed. We are focusing on Chesed (doing good deeds) this month. We will be making sandwiches for the unhoused, baking Hamantaschen for Purim and collecting items for Caitlin's Smiles, an organization that provides cheer to children who are hospitalized. Parent support needed!!!! A mandatory component of the grant are submissions to the Better Together essay contest. All students who have attended a Better Together program can enter this competition. **CRITERIA FOR WRITING SUBMISSIONS** For a Writing Submission to be eligible for a prize, it must satisfy all of the following requirements: • Topic of the essay, short story, or article must include senior citizens, the elderly, growing old, or intergenerational experiences. The writing submission must describe actual events (i.e., not be a work of fiction). • May be based on the students' participation in Better Together or experiences with the elderly independent of the program; however, essays may NOT be solely about students' experiences with their grandparents or family members. • Authors must be in grades 5-8 (middle school) or grades 9-12 (high school), or currently attending an undergraduate program at a university, and must have participated in at least 70% of the Better Together program events (which also happen during Religious School. hours). • Must reflect student work, although faculty or parents may assist with editing. FORMAT OF WRITING SUBMISSION: • Must be saved as a Word document. • Must be between 2 and 4 pages, with 2.0 line spacing, 12-point font, and 1- inch margins.


# **REPRO SHABBAT**

On Friday evening, February 9th, Temple Ohev Sholom joined as many as 2000 congregations around the country in celebrating "Repro Shabbat." This initiative was conceived by National Council of Jewish Women as a way of bringing the whole Jewish community together to discuss what our tradition teaches about reproductive freedom. It is an annual event that takes place on Parshat Mishpatim, when the Torah portion with the verses that undergird Judaism's approach to abortion - specifically, that abortion is permitted and sometimes even required if the life of the pregnant person is in danger – is read.

# **BOARD MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: IRITH HARPSTER**

In 1984 my family moved from California to Harrisburg and joined Temple Ohev Sholom. "Ohev" has been my second home for the past 40 years. We celebrated every Jewish milestone as a family in our synagogue. It is where my husband Steven became a Jew in our beautiful sanctuary and was later eulogized in 1993; our daughters Kendra and Courtney were consecrated into the religious school, became B'nai Mitzvots and were confirmed; we celebrated a marriage with Rabbi Kessler and all of my six grandchildren were named in our beautiful Lehrman chapel. My part in making Temple Ohev Sholom a place we wanted to be was to get involved. I became a sisterhood member and later its president, where I made lifelong friends. I also served on the temple board in various capacities.

I was born in Haifa Israel and shortly after the war of 1956, in 1957 my family immigrated to the United States. I grew up in Pasadena, California and went through all my Jewish milestones at a large conservative synagogue, Pasadena Jewish Temple and Center with a liberal reform Rabbi Galpert.

I attended San Diego State University where I received my BA in Child Development and later received my teaching credential and Masters in Education at the University of California Irvine. I've spent most of my years in education as an educator. First as a Pre-kindergarten and elementary school teacher, then the director of the Brenner Early Childhood Center at our JCC, later as a consultant for a social-emotional learning program written by Mark Greenberg at Penn State and finally ending my career in teaching as an Early Childhood Advisor with the PA Department of Education and later as the Director of Reading First and Early Childhood Literacy.

I currently am a member of the Temple Ohev Sholom Board of Trustees serving as the Caring Community Chairperson and on the Sisterhood Board.

To provide an opportunity for more congregants to attend our Friday night Shabbat services, the Worship Committee is implementing a new schedule for service start times. Friday night Shabbat services times will now alternate between a 7:00 p.m. service on the 1st Friday of the month, and a 6:00 p.m. service on the 2nd Friday night, and so on. For months when there is a 5th Friday, that service time will begin at 6:00 p.m.

Additionally, to allow congregants to follow the weekly Torah portion, a Torah reading will also be incorporated back into our Shabbat services on the <u>3rd and 4th Shabbat of each month</u>, unless otherwise noted, with the goal of eventually having a Torah service every Shabbat.





## On Trauma, Taxi Drivers and the JFS 2024 Annual Event

Of all the things you may want to hear from your Israeli taxi driver, you may not want to hear his opinions about the two-state solution. But more on that later.

I write this to you on the eve of Shabbat from Jerusalem. I'm in Baka, a neighborhood in Southern Jerusalem. It is a very Americanized neighborhood, and you're as likely to hear more people speaking English in the streets than Hebrew. I lived in this neighborhood for a few years in the 1990s and it feels like home. I can't say I've gauged the mood of the country, though you can feel the suffering in the air. There are signs everywhere asking for the release of the hostages and people seem much more respectful of each other and more gracious, shockingly, even in Machane Yehuda on a Friday afternoon. I guess Jerusalem still feels like Jerusalem—it is always intense and pulsing but now it feels like more. I'm reminded of a poem by a former teacher of mine, Yehuda Amichai.

**Ecology of Jerusalem** 

The air over Jerusalem is saturated with prayers and dreams

like the air over industrial cities.

It's hard to breathe.

And from time to time a new shipment of history arrives

and the houses and towers are its packing materials. Later these are discarded and piled up in dumps.

And sometimes candles arrive instead of people and then it's quiet.

And sometimes people come instead of candles and then there's noise.

And in enclosed gardens heavy with jasmine foreign consulates,

like wicked brides that have been rejected, lie in wait for their moment.

A new shipment of history arrived in the attack on October 7th and this new strata will be here for a very long time to come. You can sense the trauma all around and it permeates all of Jerusalem and beyond.

JFS, like all human service agencies in Pennsylvania, is a trauma-informed agency. In 2021, Governor Wolf mandated that the licenses social and human service agencies receive include components determining how agencies have created policies and procedures to address trauma. The American

Psychological Association defines trauma as an "emotional response to a terrible event like an accident, rape, or natural disaster. Immediately after the event, shock and denial are typical. Longer-term reactions include unpredictable emotions, flashbacks, strained relationships, and even physical symptoms like headaches or nausea. While these feelings are normal, some people have difficulty moving on with their lives. Mental health professionals can help them find constructive ways of managing their emotions."

We have a staff committee devoted to defining how we will serve our clients as a trauma-informed agency. When we had Lehrman Hall painted for our anticipated move in the weeks ahead, we made sure to request trauma-informed colors that are soothing and calming.

"Trauma" feels like a loaded word at times. In a New York Times opinion piece by Nicole Daniels called "Is 'Trauma Talk' Overused?" she writes, "Call it post-traumatic hyperbole. Or TikTok pseudo-psychology. Or even therapy-speak. There are plenty of horrible things going on in the world, and serious mental health crises that warrant such severe language. But when did we start using the language of harm to describe, well, everything?"

Using trauma-informed language can be a very good thing—it sensitizes all of us to the pain that others may have experienced. It can also be a double-edged sword if every difficult or uncomfortable experience is described using trauma-inspired language. When every negative encounter is trauma, then no experience is trauma. And there are many people experiencing real trauma today.

Back to Israeli taxi drivers. I don't use many taxis when I'm in Israel. I try my best to walk as much as I can or ride buses and trains. Taxi drivers are important sources to gauge the mood of any country. My driver, Motti, was struggling because of the lack of tourists, not enough fares and concerns for his four young children. The mood was bleak. And Yossi does not believe in a two-state solution, an opinion I suspect will be voiced in many conversations I'll be having over the next week.

I have always avoided discussing Israeli politics. I have a ground rule I set many years ago for myself—I don't discuss politics unless I have skin in the game and stand to lose something by the outcome. I don't discuss politics when it means other people's children will die suffering the consequences of the decision. But part of the reason I am here is to help my daughter, Tal, begin her process for recruitment into the Israel Defense Forces (IDF). Tal made Aliyah last year and I'm so proud of her for living out her life's dreams.

On May 31st, JFS will be holding its Annual Event, entitled "Every Child a Champion" and will feature Coach Bruce Pearl of the Auburn Men's Basketball Team. Coach Pearl is an inspirational and charismatic human being and is incredibly proud of his Jewish heritage. He champions children every day of his life and has created a family foundation to support medically fragile children. Our event is designed to proudly share the work that JFS does working with medically fragile children through our Foster Care and Adoption program. Concerns have been raised by some members of the community regarding Coach Pearl's stance on Israel and the current war. I can only say two things—his views are representative of many, if not most

Israelis today. The other is that we were not aware of his political views when we asked him to speak and we are bringing him in to share insights into championing our children, not discuss politics. We know this will be a marvelous event and I look forward to sharing more details in the weeks ahead.
