Temple Ohev Sholom is pleased to host a Congregational Sedar on **Tuesday**, **April 23**, **2024**, **starting at 6:00 p.m.** in the Social Hall. **Seating will be limited**, **reservatitons with payment by April 9th are required**.

We'll begin with the ritual meal led by Rabbi Kline, followed by matzo ball soup, gefilte fish, hardboiled eggs, beef brisket, chicken, seasonal vegetables, and kugel. Vegetarian and gluent-free entrees and matzo ball soup will be available. Sacramental wine and grape juice are provided, but feel comfortable bringing your preferred wine. Attendees are encouraged to contribute a dessert to be shared.

Reservations can be made in two ways: (i) complete the on-line reservation form and make payment at <a href="www.ohevsholom.org">www.ohevsholom.org</a>, or (ii) fill out the reservation form on the reverse side of this invitation, and return it with your check payable to Temple Ohev Sholom to the Temple Office at 2345 N. Front St., Harrisburg PA 17110.

Reservations and payment must be received by Tuesday, April 9th, and will be honored in the order received. Due to food purchase and preparation requirements no refunds will be given after April 9th.

Our Sedar coincides with Primary Election Day. If you want a mail-in ballot, your county election board must receive your mail-in ballot application by 5:00pm, April 16,2024. Polls are open on election day from 7:00am until 8:00 pm.

### **MESSAGE FROM RABBI MARC**

A comedian named Gallagher made a fortune demonstrating how amazing it is to be a child – how much we lose as we get older. His routines reminded us of how jaded we become as we age – how every potential "anything" that sparked wonder became a concrete and finite "one-thing." "The only difference between ordinary and extraordinary is that little extra." Gallagher

Likewise, Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel taught us, "Our goal should be to live life in radical amazement, get up in the morning, and look at the world in a way that takes nothing for granted. Everything is phenomenal; everything is incredible; never treat life casually. To be spiritual is to be amazed."

We take our synagogue and our religion for granted. It was, it is, and it will be. What was it? What is it? What can it be? For too many of us, it was and is a finite something. Even as we crave greater life value and more profound life meaning, we look everywhere but our faith tradition, believing that it's for old people and children: ultimately - it's irrelevant.

But do you know why children love being Jewish? We fill their world with stories and games. We make big deals out of celebrations and commemorations. We do a lot to make it fun and relevant for them, even as we ignore what might make it relevant for us. We did a great job creating excitement and wonder for our children, but we failed to develop and nurture relevant excitement and wonder as we age.

We are completing a long-range visioning process at Temple Ohev Sholom. A lot of people have shown up and helped forge a thoughtful set of core values, a mission statement with teeth, and a vision through which we rethink what it means to be an adult member of this Jewish community—over 1/3 of our member families participated in the process over the past year.

We have a lot to be thankful for and excited to implement. Special thanks go to Alan Stolberg and Marty Rogoff for guiding us through the process and to April Hutcheson, who is now guiding us through rewriting our by-laws. "Temple Ohev Sholom 2030" is well underway – we just need you to weigh in.

We are approaching that time of year when we look for new leadership for our Board of Trustees and Chairpersonships. We don't want to fill the positions with simply anyone willing to serve. Rather, we want our members to bring their interests and talents to the mix and our leadership team to lead us back into excitement, joy, and spiritual engagement. It does not matter whether we agree or disagree with politics worldwide. It matters that we find how we will thrive together and see our beloved community grow for the next generation and many more after. It's time to remember that we are still and always should be excited and amazed at all that can be possible - we must not forget that we are still children at heart, looking and living with a sense of wonder.

#### Ohev Sholom 2024 Results of Strategic Workshops

#### **Core Values**

As Harrisburg's oldest synagogue and only Reform Congregation, Temple Ohev Sholom espouses and commits to these five Core Values:

- 1. Honoring our Jewish heritage today and in the future.
- 2. Cultivating a congregational culture of belonging.
- 3. Being committed to inclusivity and diversity.
- 4. Healing the world Tikkun Olam.
- 5. Facilitating lifelong learning.

#### 1. Honoring Jewish heritage and tradition by:

### **RELIGIOUS SCHOOL NEWS**

#### **April Updates from Religious School**

While the Hebrew month of Adar is always fun and filled with hamantaschen, Purim spiels, groggers and carnivals, I am so happy that Spring (Aviv) is upon us! I'm feeling renewed by the glimpses of green I've already seen, the warmer weather, and the promise of a fresh start! This month, I'm personally entering a whole new decade and trying to bring my Spring positivity to that milestone as well. My goals are better health, being more grateful, and spending more quality time with loved ones, here and abroad. I'm excitedly planning a long-awaited visit to Israel to see family and friends, volunteer where I can, and reconnect with what I love about it.

At Religious School, we are excited for a very special guest, children's author Karen Rosteker-Gruber, visiting on April 7th at 10:00am. Join us as she takes us on adventure through The Family Haggadah. See flyer in this newsletter for details and information about ordering her books. We are also learning Passover songs and traditions that we will put into play at our model seder on April 21st. We are thrilled to welcome back our 7th graders who will also participate.

Better Together will make and taste charosets from around the world on April 14th. Did you know that not all charosets are made from apples, walnuts and wine? If you did, that's Ashkenormative. What's "Ashkenormative"? It refers to the idea that when we think of Jews and Jewishness, we think only of Ashkenazi culture, obliterating Sepharadi and Mizrahi Judaism. Another example of Ashkanormalization is when we used to hear our grandparents say "Jewish" referring to Yiddish, the Eastern European lingua franca among Jews there. This ignores Ladino, commonly spoken amongst Jews with Turkish roots, and Hebrew, the language of the Torah and all the prayers we recite, and the official language of modern Israel. As Israel became a melting pot for world Jewry, and Israeli culture became more accessible, we now recognize that Jews are a group rich in cultural diversity.

I am not the greatest student of history, but Ashkenormalization is probably a result of the preponderance of Eastern European Jews who came to America in early waves of immigration and then again in relation to WWII. Sephardic Jews, also known as Sephardim, are a Jewish diaspora population with cultural ties to the Iberian Peninsula. The word "Sephardi" comes from the Hebrew word for "Spain" while Mizrahi Jews are an ethnic group descended from people who lived in the Middle East, North Africa, and Central Asia during the Middle Ages, under Muslim rule for many generations. They are also known as Mizrahim, Mizrachi, Oriental Jews, or Edot HaMizrach. Mizrahi Jews are one of the largest Jewish ethnic groups in Israel. Differences among Jews often stem from place. Along with language, culture, and traditions, Jewish foodways are heavily influenced by the ingredients available to them, hence the variety of charosets we will prepare at Better Together. Think bananas, coconut and dates! Join us as we prepare Charosets from around the world and learn about different cultural groups. April 14, 12-2 in Sisterhood Hall.

Passover is a symbol of Spring, but that also means that many of your 3rd-6th graders are quickly approaching the end of their 24 sessions with their Hebrew tutor. I hope that it went well for your family and that you have shared with me any concerns you've had. Next year, I'd like to make a few tweaks, one is that 7th graders

will sign up for tutoring as well. They will focus on and reinforce all of the prayers and blessings that they need to lead at their Being Mitzvah. This frees me up to teach them their Torah and Haftarah portions. I think that this is a much-needed tweak to our program. When Religious School was in person twice a week, students had double the exposure to the language and rhythm of our organized prayer services. Hopefully, this adjustment will help compensate for the loss of a second in-person day. If you have thoughts about this, or are thinking of offering your services to us, our Religious School wants you and needs you. Please contact me to talk at your earliest convenience. In the meantime, enjoy the photos featured in this newsletter from our Hamantaschen baking and Purim costume contests!


